School Evaluation

In September of this year the school embarked on a whole school evaluation which focused upon teaching and learning, assessment, technology, welfare and school culture. The evaluation involved online surveys for all staff, students and parents, focus group interviews of students in each year group and parents and individual interviews of randomly selected staff and parents. The information collected from each source is currently being collated and will be issued in a report later this term. The report will highlight strengths and areas for further consideration which will inform our strategic planning for 2014 and beyond. The purpose of this evaluation is to ensure that our students continue to receive the highest quality teaching and learning experiences possible.

Thank you to the many parents who completed the online survey as part of this evaluation, your feedback and comments are greatly appreciated.

Digital Education 2014

The Digital Education initiative of the previous federal government as you are aware ends this year. In conversations with parents, staff and students it is apparent that overwhelmingly the laptop program in schools should continue. It is also clear that neither the federal nor state government will fund the distribution of laptop devices to students in Year 9, 2014.

Therefore, school personnel are currently in the process of determining the specifications of appropriate devices and negotiating with local suppliers the cost and availability of laptop devices that students can purchase for use at school in 2014

This information will be communicated to students and parents as it becomes available to us.

Riding to School Safely

In previous newsletters I have raised my concerns about students riding to school without appropriate safety head gear. Unfortunately, some students persist in riding to school without helmets. In future students who are seen to be riding without appropriate safety helmets will have their bikes confiscated. The confiscated bikes can then be collected by parents or by students when they have the appropriate head gear.

Elective Fees 2014

As communicated previously the collection of elective fees

2014 has commenced. All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 have been informed of their successful elective selections for 2014. Students have also been informed that to secure a place in their desired elective, a minimum of 50% of the elective fee must be paid prior to the commencement of the course. As always financial assistance is available on application.

Students who do not pay the associated elective fee will be given the choice of selecting an alternative elective that does not attract a fee.

the day valuable and enjoyable for all students.
















In the Mathematics classes the Year 5 students created colourful cubes out of six parallelogram puzzle pieces in a shape / language exercise.



BOOK CLUB









YEARLY REPORTS AND STUDENT ABSENCES

Year 11 have received their yearly reports and other year groups will receive theirs later this term. On the front page of the reports student absences are shown. The report shows both partial and whole day absences as well as explained and unexplained absences.

Parents are often surprised at the amount of unexplained absences their children have had and occasionally the school has been asked to change unexplained absences on reports. Even with a note covering the absences they cannot be changed after the reports have been generated. School rolls are marked electronically and these tallies are rolled into the reports automatically.

Accurate student absence records are important to the school as they are an official document. Department policy also states that if a child is absent from school then a note explaining the absence should be forwarded to the school as soon as possible.

It is understandable that parents / carers can forget to write a note or that the note becomes lost. For this reason, once a month reminder letters are sent to the parents of students with unexplained absences. It is important that these notes be responded to so that records can be keep up to date.




