We will not be able to process cash, cheque, EFTPOS or online payments at this time.



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LIBRARY NEWS





This fortnight Manga members played competitive Yu - Yi - Oh. *Yu-Gi-Oh* tells the tale of Yugi , a timid young boy who loves all sorts of games, but is often bullied around. <u>READING</u> Bibliotherapy for Teens: Recommended Fiction



Bibliotherapy is an old concept in <u>library science</u>. The <u>ancient Greeks</u> maintained that literature was psychologically and

spiritually important, posting a sign above their library doors describing itself as a "healing place for the soul". In its most basic form, bibliotherapy is using books to aid people in solving the issues that they may be facing at a particular time. It consists of selecting reading material relevant to a child's life situation.

The statistics about teens and mental illness are staggering. In addition to the 2.2 million who experienced depression within the past 12 months, according to the NIMH data, 25.1 percent of youth from ages 12 to 17 experienced some sort of anxiety within the same time period, whether it was generalized, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), agoraphobia, or something else. Nine percent had attention deficit disorder, and two percent had an eating disorder. The list goes on.



Can reading help significantly? We use books with parents and kids to promote the feeling that their problems are not isolated

problems," says

Lisa Estivill, the director of Adolescent Therapeutic Education and After School Services at Washington County (VT) Mental Health Services. "Many of our kids have read books in class and with their clinicians to help them better contextualize their disabilities and/or validate their experience. "While professionals agree that bibliotherapy isn't a mainstream methodology or a replacement for professional therapy, it can be a beneficial part of the therapeutic process.

SPIDER DAY FRIDAY






