

YEAR 10

Work Experience

As per usual the Year 10 Work Experience Week met with a couple of hurdles but has gone off without a major hitch.

As per usual every employer I spoke with was very satisfied and some even ecstatic with the work ethic and attitude of our students. This is a credit to all of our teaching staff and parents who boost the confidence of and help to shape the positive self concepts of our students.

At least one student, Jackson Mitchell, was offered an apprenticeship.

More, including Calllum Clarges and Alex Glasgow, have been offered part time/casual work.

I have spoken to all of the students that participated and they, almost unanimously, rate the experience very highly. I made a very deliberate effort to encourage students to find placements that they were truly interested in pursuing when they have completed school and I think this contributed to the students' positive experiences. Of course a few students have discovered jobs that they definitely do not want to pursue. This is a 'positive' outcome as well.

Almost 95% of our Year 10 students have participated in Work Experience this year. This is astronomically higher than the rates of participation at our neighbouring DEC schools.

At Woonona High School we are very fortunate too that so many employers in the Greater Illawarra, and in a few cases South Sydney, are willing to give our students a chance to gain Work Experience. We are very thankful to all employers that support our Work Experience program.


Thank you as well to all of the staff that pitched in and checked on students as well as the parents that helped by providing transport and many other forms of support.



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
BOOK CLUB


