The focus of our extensive program was to educate our students within an age appropriate context about the issue of domestic violence and its prevalence within our community. The consistent message shared with all of our students was the importance of respectful and equal relationships.



I would like to thank those staff who wrote programs, delivered the lessons, arranged for guest presenters and arranged fundraising activities. It has been a significant initiative and judging by the response of students a very worthwhile one. Congratulations to all involved.

What is White Ribbon?





Over the past four weeks students and staff at Woonona High School have taken part in a series of activities and lessons that reinforce the White Ribbon message—to stop violence against women and to educate people about the importance of positive, healthy and respectful relationships. In educating our students about their friendships with their friends at school and their interactions with teachers it is hoped that they will be able to maintain happy and healthy relationships away from school with their families, team mates and other friends.

In this issue we highlight the events and programs that our students have taken part in.



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WHITE RIBBON FORMAL ASSEMBLY



On Tuesday, Woonona High School held a formal assembly recognise White Ribbon day. White Ribbon day is Australia's only male-led campaign to end men's violence against women. It signals the start of 16 days of activism to stop violence against women, which finishes on December 10th, Human Rights Day. Before being moved to the main hall for the formal assembly, students were all provided with a white ribbon to either wear on their wrist or in their hair. The white ribbon signifies innocence and peace and is an icon for this cause. Ryan Boland and Nathan Boyle hosted a very considered and diverse assembly, honoured and respected by the student body.

During the assembly students from all years spoke about the different programs that had been held during the White Ribbon Campaign. Year 7 and 8 representatives talked about the Peer Mentoring program and activities they had taken part in, Year 9 and 10's programs included informal classroom workshops all dealing with domestic violence, how it can be recognised, its forms and impact and where to seek assistance if necessary. Year 11 girls had undertaken a confronting workshop called "He Loves Me, He Loves Me Not" and Year 9 and 10 boys had participated in a talk from Dragons players. There is more information on these programs on page 6 of this issue.

Local police officers also addressed the assembly speaking about the impact of domestic violence and its impact on our society.

Ms Pryor's dance ensemble performed a beautifully choreographed contemporary piece that epitomised the struggle of victims of domestic violence. It was a complex piece superbly performed by the students, provoking an empathetic response from the audience.

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WHITE RIBBON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE WORK SHOP





Last week, Year 11 students attended a talk from a local police officer about domestic violence within Australia. We were given the option to sit through a video that dealt with a real life abusive relationship. This was extremely confronting and allowed the situation to become more real for us. Today, 2 women die due to domestic violence situations every week. This statistic seems unrealistic in such a developed society, however violent and abusive relationships are more common than they appear. These relationships are not only between a woman and a man. They can consist of parents and children, carers and the patient and same sex couples. The talk allowed us as students to recognise the cycle of violence within a relationship and encourage us to speak out and provide information for the victim. Additionally, it suggested ways in which we as individuals within an abusive relationship can take steps to leave the situation. The police officer highlighted what a strong and healthy relationship consisted of; trust, communication and most importantly respect for one another.

However, she also brought to our attention the signs of a destructive relationship. It starts with a building of tension between the two partners and moves on to an incident. This can be both verbal and physical abuse. This ends with one apologising to the other and leading into a calm stage which eventually cycles back to tension building. Attending this talk allowed us to see the reality of the situation and the prevalence of domestic violence within Australia.

Through this type of education our generation is able to positively shape the statistic of domestic violence within homes for the future.

WHITE RIBBON ACTIVITIES AND CLASSES

At the formal assembly students recapped some of the specialised classes and programs they had participated in:

Year 7 - The program started off with a group meeting in the staff common room, where Mr Rayner explained the importance of White Ribbon Day for Year 7 and the focus on positive, healthy friendships. The students then broke up into their peer leadership groups and discussed the ingredients of a healthy friendship, creating posters of these characteristics.

Year 8 – The formalised classroom lessons that Year 8 received are part of the new NSW education syllabus. They learned about the difference between biological and behavioural differences of men and women and learned how stereotypes influence our society. This was followed with a class activities enabling them to make their own decisions about whether a man, woman or both genders fit into each category.

Years 9 & 10 – These classes undertook a program of workshops that assist the students to recognise domestic violence. They undertook many activities to develop a deeper understanding of domestic violence, its forms and impacts and positive responses they can make to these terrible situations. Students have also learned about self-worth and how to build resilient and supportive relationships.

Year 11 – Senior Constable Sian Popp delivered a workshop to the female students in Year 11. The students attended the confronting workshop "He Loves Me, Love Me Not" which detailed the saddening statistics of domestic violence in Australia. The talk allowed the students to recognise the cycle of violence within a relationship and encourage them to speak out and provide information for the victim. Additionally, it suggested ways in which individuals within an abusive relationship can take steps to leave the situation.

WHITE RIBBON—OZ TAG



A group of very enthusiastic students and teachers took part in a nail biting game of Oz Tag on Thursday 19 November. The game was played in honour of White Ribbon and was a chance for the students and staff to share some bonding time and have some fun together.

The weather was extremely warm but several of our brave teachers including Mr Rayner, Ms Bolam, Ms Walker, Mr Mucci, Ms Burns and Ms Potter stepped up to the challenge and took on our students. In a tight battle teachers managed to take out the students 4—2.

The final of the competition was scheduled for Thursday 26 November but because of the extreme heat the match was cancelled. Weather permitting this match will be rescheduled for next week.

This was a joint excursion organised by Mr Wilson (Woonona) and Mr Laidler (Corrimal). Students met bright and early at Woonona train station at 6:30 and caught a train to the domestic terminal. While waiting for the flight to Hervey Bay the students happened to run into Justice Crew who were more than happy to stop and have a chat and pose for a photo.

After flying to Hervey Bay students caught a connecting flight to Lady Elliot Island on a small 10 seater plane. Going in everyone was a little nervous and the stormy QLD weather made the trip quite eventful.

Once settled into their eco cabins at Lady Elliot Island the days were passed by snorkelling with manta rays, reef sharks, turtles, big cod and beautiful coral formations. Between dives students learned about the sustainability of the eco resort and the fragility of the reef ecosystem. Guided reef walks and glass bottom boat tours provided amazing insights into the complex interactions that keep the reef thriving and in pristine condition.

It was widely agreed that the experiences of snorkelling in such a beautiful and pristine environment would never be forgotten and helped everyone to develop a profound appreciation for the beauty of the marine environment and the importance of conservation.



Red Day for Nepal

The SRC are organizing a *Red Day*, Friday, Week 9 to raise money for *Food for Life: Nepal* (FFLN), in association with our local Rotary Club. FFLN is a program based on the belief that one meal a day brings thousands of children to school. Malnutrition is the main cause of death for as many as 50,000 Nepali children each year and by the end of 2015 FFLN hopes to serve 1000 meals a day to children who come from an under-privileged background.

To help the needy in Kathmandu, volunteers are doing all they can to reach as many people as possible, despite the challenging conditions after the earthquake in April this year. In Sankhu (16 km from Kathmandu), the houses along the road had been destroyed and debris lay along the pavement of the road. The people there are without food and shelter. This is why we are having a fundraiser to support *Food for Life Nepal* and help the needy. Everything we raise is going straight to this appeal.

We chose the theme *Red Day* because crimson red is Nepal's national colour and the main colour on their flag. The flag was adopted after Prithvi Narayan Shah unified all small principalities of Nepal. In modern times the concept of the flag has changed to have a different meaning. The blue border symbolizes peace and harmony and the crimson red indicates the brave spirits of the Nepalese people.



THE IMPORTANCE OF READING AND HEALTH





5 Ways in which reading matters for your children's health by Dr Laura Bailet

Reading is the single strongest predictor of adult health status. Research shows that your reading level is a powerful predictor of your health as an adult. It helps determine your academic success, job opportunities, and income.

Reading difficulty is a major child health concern. Learning to read is an important childhood milestone, just like learning to walk and talk. When a child struggles with reading, it can affect learning, behaviour, emotions, and even physical health.

Reading readiness screening is an important part of developmental monitoring. The brain foundation for future reading success starts building from birth, through lots of talking, reading, singing, and playing with your child. Just like hearing and vision, checking your child's reading readiness progress, starting at age three, is an important health activity. If your child is on track, you will be reassured that you are doing the right things to help her prepare for future reading success

Reading helps kids cope with medical problems. Reading is a great way to learn about a medical problem you are facing, and many children's books are written for this purpose. Reading with your young child about characters facing similar health problems can help him feel less alone, understand the problem and aspects of treatment, and learn positive coping strategies

Books are great companions for sick days. When your child needs to rest indoors while sick, books can help fill the time, bring new places, characters, and experiences into his world, and, if you are reading together, offer special bonding opportunities.

SCHOOL TRANSPORT SCHEME



The school has been notified by NSW Transport that the old "Bus Pass" has now been replaced by the "School Opal Card".

The School Opal Card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school, using the bus or train.

Students who already have a travel pass do not need to apply for an Opal Card. It will be sent to school at the beginning of the school year in 2016.

An application is needed if the student:

- Has not had a travel pass before
- Is moving from Year 6 to 7
- Is changing schools
- Is changing address

- Print sign and date the completed application, then submit it to the school for endorsement.




