Sydney Dance Company Workshop



On Monday 28th November, 24 students from Years 7-10 were inspired and challenged by a member from Sydney Dance Company, Kye Maurer. From an intricate warm-up sequence, to technical contemporary dance corrections, the students were individually challenged to push their boundaries and reach new potentials. Some of the students had minimal dance experience and I was so impressed to see them working hard to keep up with the more advanced students.

Kye took the students through a creative task, complete with inspirational pictures to draw out interpretation and collaboration within the group. Firstly, students had to individually create 8 counts of movement. This was then performed in pairs, groups of four, then in a group of 12. The intent of the creative process was to create an efficient movement sequence where each student was working in harmony. A very impressive process by all.

Next up was a choreographic sequence, where Kye taught the students a phrase from the most recent dance work, 'Untamed'. This was a challenging moment where the students had to learn the choreography quickly and perform to the best of their abilities. Needless to say, they all did very well to learn a professional piece of work in such a short period of time!

Once the 2 hours were up, the students debriefed about what they enjoyed the most about their experience. A highlight for the majority of the students was to 'learn the 'Untamed' choreography', 'having a male dance teacher', 'work as a team to achieve their own creative sequences' and there were a few who 'didn't want it to end'.

On behalf of all students involved, we would like to extend our thanks to Kye and Sydney Dance Company for providing our school with this amazing opportunity. We look forward to hosting them again in the coming year.

CAPA Camp

Last week, 45 Woonona High School students went on a three day camp to start working on our annual Creative and Performing Arts (CAPA) Showcase. In 2016 we have decided on the theme 'Live Loud'. See page 16 for details. This year CAPA Camp consisted of art students, music students, singers, drama students and dancers. After a short drive down the coast to the Waterslea Centre at Nowra, the journey started.

As a part of this camp all CAPA students came together to create large group items for Variety Night. These included Live Louder, Play That Sax, This Girl and Let's Get Loud. The first 2 days all students split off into their preferred CAPA discipline groups to learn their parts for all of these songs, while our Art students started work on the beautiful paintings and drawings you can see in our poster.



This camp wasn't just for students to stick to their preferred faculty – each day workshops were run where students could try out a different faculty, for example singers could go and try art for a lesson.

Each night after dinner all students and teachers came together to the main hall and we worked on an A Capella song. All students learnt to sing this song without any instrumental accompaniment. During this project students were able to stretch their limits and discover a whole new side to music. Students were given jam time during the day. Jam time is where students could rehearse small ensemble or solo items that they will be auditioning in week 9. The students had the freedom to sing, play and dance to whatever song they wanted. And most importantly they had fun with friends whilst in their small ensembles.

The second afternoon the students and teachers were able to use the camp water slide and pool, and this was such a relief as it was 36 degrees that day. In the evenings, students rehearsed again before some downtime playing Just Dance on the Wil.

The last day we all came together and practised our large group items as a team, playing each song without a backing track - it was just the students playing the instruments, singing and dancing. We also completed our A Capella song, before leaving for home as everyone was tired and sick of flies.

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"Thankyou"



On Wednesday 30 November a special assembly was called to listen to a presentation given by Kalvin Hart from the "Thankyou" organisation. Thankyou was born in 2008 in response to the World Water Crisis. At that time, over 900 million people didn't have access to safe drinking water on a daily basis and founders of the organisation came up with an idea to launch a line of bottled water that would fund water projects overseas. After the success of the water project, Thankyou has now branched into other products including food, body and baby care and the products are available in 5000 outlets in Australia (including 7 Eleven, Coles and Woolworths). 100% of profits go to funding safe water, food and hygiene, and sanitation services around the world.

Ms Steele (who organized the presentation), said that she hoped the presentation would raise awareness amongst our staff and students, that it would challenge our thinking and hopefully inspire us to realise that we can make an impact in the world. Good Luck for the future Elisa and we hope to see you back here again.




Book Club




