### **Amazing Screens!**





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### Year 9 Minnamurra Excursion

On Tuesday 14.11.17 Year 9 Science students had the opportunity to go to Minamurra Rainforest to conduct scientific research in relation to their current unit of work "Ecosystems". They started the day with a presentation from one of the guides in relation to the rainforest. The students learnt about the types of plants and animals they would find on their walk and the relationships they have with one another. They also learnt about abiotic and biotic factors in ecosystems. The guide then discussed the history of the rainforest and some current sustainability and conservation methods within the National Park and the reasons behind them.

Students then took part in some scientific research and looked at abiotic factors within the rainforest. Such things included temperature of the air, water and soil, air humidity, wind speed, pH of the water and the soil and they also looked at the turbidity of the river water. One group took extra readings within the rainforest along the guided walk and compared the results to what they recorded at base camp.

All attending students are to be congratulated on a fantastic day. The support and encouragement they gave each other along the walk was great, especially when the walk became quite steep in sections. Unfortunately we couldn't get access to the big waterfall at the end of the self-guided walk, but the students were lucky enough to see some of the native wildlife common to the National Park.

Upon arrival back to school I received this lovely email from the Minnamurra Rainforest Education Coordinator "On behalf of the staff at Minnamurra Rainforest, we would like to pass on our thanks to attending teachers and students. The feedback from our 3 guides was that the students were quiet, well-mannered and respectful. We trust you had a great day and look forward to seeing you again." Congratulations Year 9.



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### **Artful Mythbusters**

Students in the Year 9/10 Mythbusters elective class have enjoyed a fantastic year investigating truths and exploring plausibility. They have busily engaged themselves in the art of asking questions and generating hypotheses, seeking to explain phenomena both real and imagined! They recently completed a problem based learning unit with the driving question "Can we turn wasteful into artful?" Students worked collaboratively to construct an artful representation of the wastefulness of society using recyclable materials. They also wrestled with the notion of the power of the individual to make a difference. Students produced an explanation of the statement that they sought to make through their art and critically analysed their role as consumers. Some amazing and creative artworks were on display during our mini-expo, ranging from a pink pig made from a tin can to an entire farmyard made out of styrofoam. Congratulations to all of the Mythbusters students for their brilliant efforts!











### **Australian Mathematics Competition**

The Australian Mathematics Competition was first held in 1978 and has now been running for 40 years. Conducted by the Australian Mathematics Trust it is highly regarded and very challenging. Students are not allowed to use a calculator and the questions become increasingly more difficult as the examination paper progresses.

The Maths Faculty funded entry into this event and selected 5 top students to represent Woonona High school in 2017.

Emily Nicholson, Jaida Way, Elisa He, Harrison Dabin and Jay Archer are all fine Mathematicians, each of them very intelligent, resilient and innovative.

Harrison produced the strongest performance on the day and received a certificate of Distinction. This award recognises Harrison's outstanding capabilities and placed him in the top 20% of all students in his division.

Jaida Way was another strong performer for our school. She achieved a certificate of Credit ranking her in the top 50% of her cohort.

#### Year 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

Students should have collected their Employer package but please remove copies for parents and themselves, first. Please make sure they carry or transfer the necessary phone numbers from their Emergency Card, also in the pack.

Students, at the end of their placement, should ask for the completed yellow Employer Assessment at the end of the week and bring to Mrs Crump in Careers on return to school.

#### CHANGING YOUR UNIVERSITY COURSE PREFERENCES

#### Why would you change your preferences?

- · You got a better mark than you expected, and want to apply for a more competitive course
- · Or, you didn't do as well as you'd hoped to, and want to change to a more realistic course
- · Perhaps you've changed your mind in the time between applying and getting your results, and want to go down a different path
- · A new (and more appealing) course has just become available. Or you recently found out about a course you didn't know existed
- · Sometimes universities choose to cancel a course, and you may want to replace it

#### WHY You Wouldn't Change Preferences?

· If you have been offered a UOW Early Admission (or any other University Early AdmissionProgram such as SRS), then you need to ensure that your first preference matches the course that you have been offered.

#### **Changing Preferences**

- · You can change the order of your preferences or even the courses you've selected as often as you like before the closing dates for each offer round. Simply log in to your application or the My UAC mobile app using your UAC application number and UAC PIN. You can't change your preferences by phone, letter or email.
- · Check the closing dates for changing preferences for each offer round. You can only receive one

offer per round, so re-ordering your preferences after each round may give you multiple offers to choose from.

· There are short periods before each offer round when you are unable to change your preferences

#### in your application.

· Some courses have early closing dates. This means that you must have the course as a preference by the course closing date. Check the latest course information through the course search.

#### Alternative pathways to higher education | myfuture

Remind students about their career options and pathways. Research the range of alternative entry pathways to university and consider the 500 plus occupations across Australia that offer apprenticeships in a variety of certificate levels. ### **Expressions of interest**

Expressions of interest are now being sought from interested students who will be in Years 9, 10 or 11 in 2018 who are considering participating in Woonona High School's bi-annual tour of Central Australia.

The bus/camping tour extends to the Kakadu region and ends in Darwin with a flight home to Sydney. Activities are wide and varied and have included in the past camel rides, hiking Kings Canyon and around Uluru. Visits to indigenous cultural centres, boat cruises through Katherine Gorge and a Yellow Rivers Cruise in Kakadu. We even spend a night sleeping underground in a former opal mine in Coober Pedy,

Initial costing for next years excursion has been supplied by our tour company GET Educational Tours. At this stage these can only be based on 2017 costing as 2018 rates are not yet available. At present time the estimated cost of the tour is \$2,329.00 per student. This is based on attracting at least 30 students and would reduce if more students decide to participate. The tour is set to depart on the Saturday before the last week of Term 2 2018 and extend up until the end of the first week of the June/July school holidays.

# Adolescent human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccination program

In early 2017 parents/carers of Year 7 students were asked to provide consent for their children to receive three doses of HPV vaccine in the NSW School Vaccination Program.

Most\* Year 7 students who have received two doses of HPV vaccine are considered to be fully vaccinated and <u>do not</u> require a further dose.

This change is based on recent international studies that show for children aged 9 to 14 years of age, two doses of HPV vaccine provide the same protection as three doses, as long as the second dose is given at least six months after the first dose. Based on this evidence, the World Health Organization (WHO) now recommends a two-dose HPV schedule, and this has already been adopted in comparable countries (i.e. the UK, Canada, the United States and New Zealand) and is now being adopted in Australia.

In 2017 Year 7 students were given the second dose of HPV vaccine at least six months after the first dose to accommodate the urgent roll-out of the Meningococcal W Response Program to Year 11 and 12 students. Year 7 students who have received only one dose of HPV this year will be offered their second dose in 2018. Parents/carers whose children were vaccinated in 2017 but who still wish for their child to receive a third dose of HPV vaccine can access a free dose from their general practitioner (GP).

\* Students with significantly impaired immune systems are still recommended to have three doses of HPV vaccine. Parents of these students should make arrangements to complete the vaccine course with their GP or by calling their local public health unit on 1300 066 055.
