
At the end of the race predictions of how well their investments performed were made, and the winning team, with the most money, will be announced next week.

Woonona High School student Aiden Checklin is a member of "The Gong Invaders" robotics team which took out the Wollongong Regional FLL (FIRST LEGO League) tournament.

The team's victory at the UOW Innovation Campus and Science Centre on November 25 secured The Gong Invaders a spot in the National Championships. There were 30 FLL teams from across NSW who took part in the intense STEM competition in Wollongong.

Teams of children aged 9-16 presented original research, demonstrated their abilities to work as a team, and ran their robots.

The FIRST© LEGO© League involves over 25,000 teams around the world. In part students (aged 9-16) are required to build autonomous robots from LEGO® technology and conduct scientific research. Well done to Aiden and the team.

Let's keep checking in on each other.

REMEMBER

In the unlikely event that things do not go our way, we will all feel despair, anger, resentment, grief and loss. It's important to be with those you love, talk about how you feel and remember that we will come through this. Our love and our resilience will last longer than any postal survey and its outcomes.
